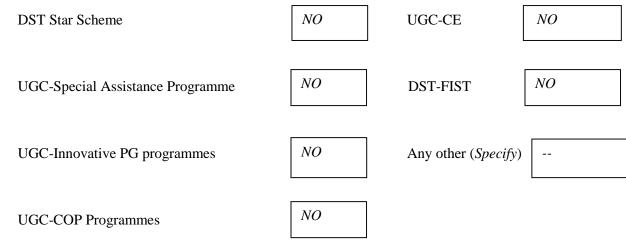

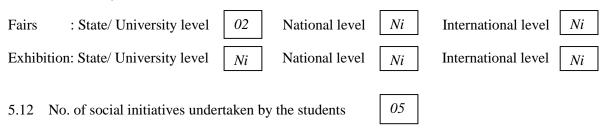

- The College can boast of near perfect academic discipline. There has been no disruption in the Academic Calendar due to disturbances that institutions of higher learning generally experience in India.
- The research activity of the institute has been noticeably enhanced. The number of publications by the faculty members in the last four years has been commendable.
- The College is considered a reputed institution of higher learning in the region and this makes it possible to get a great deal of support and co-operation from other institutions of higher learning as well as industrial houses, the Institute looks forward to making MOUs with various organisations.
- The NSS and NCC wings of the College have been very active and have participated with great enthusiasm in activities like blood donation, first aid training, health awareness survey etc
- The implementation of CBCS from the university in line with the UGC directives gave a new form to the academic activities of the institution. The members of the BOS actively contributed in redesigning the syllabus as per the CBCS.

<u>Weaknesses</u>

- The college has been striving to establish its Alumni Association since long. All the departments have started working in this direction and very soon the integrated efforts would result in the strong network of the alumni.
- *Many good practices have been institutionalised, however some good practices have been initiated and are still to be internalised and institutionalised.*
- The automation of the library progressed steadily, through all these years after the first cycle of accreditation. The complete digitalisation of the library will take a little more time.

Opportunities

- The level of academic excellence which the College has acquired makes it possible for the institute to be eligible for the Centre Par Excellence and also for Autonomy. The College has to devise mechanisms for translating this potential into a reality.
- The new learning of the age requires greater proficiency in soft skills among students and teachers. The College has the necessary technical and infrastructural resources to take this to a higher level.
- There is a lot of opportunity available for executing the Institute Social Responsibility in the district and around. The extension activity of the institute could cove a wider range of activity through more participation.

Challenges

- The institute has the resources to initiate new courses required for the students of this region. The process of launching new courses has been initiated.
- The institute has to appoint adhoc staff against the vacancies due to Government policies. This affects the academic and administrative quality of the institute.
- The institute is very much aware about the quality enhancement in all respects and has been progressing steadily, through many proactive measures need to be taken for achieving technological, infrastructural as well as academic goals.
